Family Structure & Marital Status Hot Facts

Introduction

Statistics Canada provides the City with information on family size and family structure by marital and commonlaw status, as well as information on family size.

This edition of Hot Facts provides figures from the 2021 and 2016 Census related to family structure and marital status, and compares them with other municipalities within Greater Vancouver.

Census Families

A census family refers to a married couple and the children, if any, of either and/or both spouses; a couple living common law and the children, if any, of either and/or both partners; or a parent of any marital status in a one parent family with at least one child living in the same dwelling and that child or those children. All members of a particular census family live in the same dwelling. Children may be biological or adopted children regardless of their age or marital status as long as they live in the dwelling and do not have their own married spouse, common law partner or child living in the dwelling. Grandchildren living with their grandparent(s) but with no parents present also constitute a census family.

Private Households

Private household refers to a person or group of persons who occupy the same dwelling and do not have a usual place of residence elsewhere in Canada or abroad. The household universe is divided into two sub universes on the basis of whether the household is occupying a collective dwelling or a private dwelling. The latter is a private household.

The following table summarizes census family statistics for Richmond in 2016 and 2021.



Average Number of Persons per Census Family by Planning Area



Richmond has 60,820 census-family households out of a total of 81,080 private households. The 2021 Census estimates that the average size of census families is 2.8 persons.

83.3% of Richmond's families include either married (46,185) or common-law (4,465) couples with a further 16.7% (10,165) being one-parent families. One-parent families in which the parent is a woman (8,380) accounts for 82.4% of one-parent families with one-parent families in which the parent is a man (1,785) accounts for 17.6%.

Household Type (2021 Census)

One-census family households without additional persons make up the largest household type in Richmond, accounting for 59.8% of all households. This category includes couple-family households with children (28.0%), couple-family households without children (22.3%), and one-parent family households (9.5%).

Family Size


The proportion of two person families has continued to increase since 2016, with four and five or more person families decreasing. The proportion of 3 person, 4 person, and 5 or more person families continues to decrease.
