The Officers at the Station handle non-emergency complaints within the Steveston area. They also identify community concerns with an eye to problem solving. They recognize the value of partnerships with residents, businesses, associations and local government in creating a safe and enjoyable community.

Regular uniformed Police Officers and volunteers staff the Station.

Volunteers provide front counter and switchboard service and distribute crime prevention information. They manage and operate crime prevention programs within the community.

Station Sponsored Outreach

Programs

Speed Watch

This program educates drivers and promotes safe driving habits by alerting drivers to their vehicle speed. Volunteers use electronic reader boards to clock speeds, which gives the driver instant feedback. Volunteers keep records of license plates and speeds, which are forwarded to the Constables.



Home Security Checks

Crime Prevention through Environmental Design Staff are trained in identifying deficiencies in home security, assist the public in checking their home's interior and exterior for security weaknesses.

These checks are done by appointment only, and can be booked through Block Watch at 604-207-4790.

Foot Patrol

Volunteers patrol the Steveston village area in pairs. The Station provides reflective gear for volunteers to wear while on shift. The purpose of this program is to observe and report suspicious/criminal activities to the Station Constables. The volunteers do not have Police or enforcement powers.

Business Watch

A program that informs local businesses of scams, counterfeit money, and criminal occurrences as they occur. Volunteers use phone, fax, and volunteers on foot to distribute "alerts". These "alerts" warn businesses of criminal activity and suspicious persons in the area.

Over three hundred local businesses are registered with Business Watch. Information alerts are specific and timely and may include suspect descriptions and crime prevention techniques. (ie. in the detection of counterfeit bills).

Bike Patrol

Volunteer Bike Patrol operates seasonally from May to October. The volunteers patrol during Station hours and ride in pairs. The Station provides reflective gear and bicycles. The purpose of this program is to observe and report suspicious/criminal activities to the Police.

This program is physically challenging and extensive training is provided.



Lock Out Auto Crime (LOAC)

This ICBC program is used to increase community awareness of theft from vehicles. Volunteers audit parking lots looking for vehicles with: visible valuables, garage door openers, open windows or doors that are left unlocked. All vehicles are given a notice, either thanking them for securing their vehicle properly, or advising them how they can deter auto theft.

Stolen Auto Recovery (SAR)

Steveston Community Police Station volunteers team up with a partner for four-hour Stolen Auto Recovery patrols. Equipped with radios and portable computers, the team records license plate numbers of parked and moving vehicles. If the input matches the plate number of a vehicle listed on a BC "hot sheet" of stolen autos - volunteers immediately alert the Police about their finding. Each year in communities around BC, volunteers help to recover hundreds of stolen vehicles.

Block Watch

Block Watch is a neighbourhood-based program that teaches participants to report suspicious activities to the Police and each other. Block Watch teaches target hardening (crime prevention) techniques and personal safety. Business owners can request a CPTED (Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design) assessment through the Block Watch office.
