

Alexandra Neighbourhood Public Art Plan

The Alexandra Neighbourhood Public Art Plan builds on the history and ecology of the Alexandra Neighbourhood of West Cambie. The Public Art Plan identifies opportunities for public art to play a role in achieving a connected community.

Connectivity: Ecology, Infrastructure, and History

In keeping with the West Cambie Area Plan's vision for this neighbourhood as a "complete and balanced" community, artists will be encouraged to explore the many layers of urban systems required for sustainable and healthy living cities.

Connecting Ecology

Richmond's landscape has been formed by the Fraser River delta and its wildlife is connected to larger environments throughout Richmond. Public art can play an integral part in bringing awareness to the challenges of designing with ecosystems in mind.

Connecting Infrastructure

Richmond is building a sustainable city through innovative infrastructure initiatives such as the Alexandra District Energy Utility that provides geothermal energy to heat and cool homes in the neighbourhood. Public art can help tell the story of sustainable public works in the development of neighbourhoods.

Connecting History

The Alexandra Neighbourhood's agricultural heritage and geological history are rich themes for artistic exploration. Public art will assist this new community in creating memorable places, by linking the past to the present.

Achieving a Connected Community

The network of public open space in Alexandra affords an opportunity to place public art in the public realm, both on privately-owned and City-owned land, to serve as landmarks, place-makers or integrated site elements.


