Reasons for Serving

- Felt should contribute to the operation of the municipality
- Five (of his own) children requiring education
- Some pressure from the Medical Association to contribute more to their communities

- Study by Mr. R. A. McMath and Clive Justice on combined use of school grounds and park sites - explains... and is still in use today.

Schools

- Constructed:
 - Steveston Junior Secondary School & Thompson School
 - Additions to Grauer, Blundell & General Currie
 - Annex to Mitchell School
 - Several satelite type of schools built --explains

Experiment

- School Board maintenance crew allowed to bid on renovations to Cambie School (new wing and gym.) against other construc-

tion people, and the crew won the contract. The final cost was much higher than the original bid - the School Board then abandoned this type of procedure.

School Referendums (approx. 2)

- Advertised in local press

School Referendums -- continued

- Pamphlets sent home with children to advise parents of
 - situation regarding double shifting
 - loss of teaching facilities
 - loss of time
- Each referendum passed.

School Board Offices

- Was in the Richmond High School
 - one small room
 - the board room was there as well
- In the last year of Dr. Talmey's term, new offices were constructed adjacent to the Municipal Hall, where he served his last year and are still presently located.

Night School Classes

- Organized in the early fifties under the direction of Colonel Burnett and his staff. They were adequately attended and much in demand.

Population

- Population exploding rapidly.
- Planning portion of the Board trying to take care of expected students in our schools.

Naming of Schools

- At this time it was decided to name schools in honor of our senior citizens or pioneers of our Municipality.
- Each new school would be given a name as a result of this.

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Planning of School Locations

- Each developed in conjunction with the School Board and the Municipality obliged to reserve some of the area for school and park site - explains.
- Felt small schools should be built in several areas rather than bus children to schools. Bussing was a big item of the budget then.
- Era of real planning began in Richmond to benefit the tax payers explains.
- Portable schools placed around areas where double shifting had arisen in spite of school population predictions,
 - particularly used for elementary class rooms such as at Mitchell School.
