

# CLIPPINGS THAT APPEAR DEAD CAN RETURN TO LIFE WITH TERRIFYING CONSEQUENCES!

Raked leaves, cut grass, branches, soil and debris from old planters; when dumped in green space and left unmonitored, yard waste can seriously impact our local environment and biodiversity. For example:

- Invasive plants can be introduced and spread from seeds, small sections of cut roots or branches.
- The debris can smother and kill native plants.
- Dumped waste is unsightly and diminishes the aesthetic value of green areas.
- Dumping yard waste encourages others to do the same, creating even more disturbance.
- Piles of dry debris create a fire hazard.
- Yard waste can attract rats and other pests.

Bylaw 6803 prohibits dumping yard waste or any other discarded materials on any road, park or public space.

#### **Appropriate Disposal**

Yard waste from single-family homes will be collected from bins that are 80 litres or smaller and marked with a Green Can decal. Do not place plastic or biodegradable bags in your Green Can.

Alternatively, the City Recycling Depot at 5555 Lynas Lane will collect one cubic yard per visit of yard waste without charge. Proof of residency is required.
